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Is quartz or quartzite suitable for a fireplace surround in a Calgary home?

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Can I remove my old brick fireplace surround and install stone in my Calgary home?

Yes, you can remove an old brick surround and install stone, but this is a significant renovation that requires careful planning around structural elements, clearance requirements, and potential permit needs.
